



Artist of the Month Recognition

Michelangelo di Lodovico Buonarroti Simon

Born: March 6, 1475, Caprese (near Florence) in

Tuscany, Italy, Died: 1864

<u>Quote:</u> The greater danger for most of us is not that our aim is too high and we miss it, but that it is too low and we hit it.

Michelangelo di Lodovico Buonarroti Simon is his complete name but the name he is most commonly known by appeared only once as his signature on, the first of his two most famous marble sculptures, La Pieta in 1499. To provide some context to the historical timeline, I used to remind my students that Columbus had "sailed the ocean blue in 1492" a mere 7years earlier when Michelangelo was just 24 years old. His other most famous 18-foot marble sculpture, David, with its completion somewhere from 1501-1504. How many of us hit our world famous artistic stride in our twenties?

La Pieta captures the profound expression of humanity in the figures' forms, in the poignant depiction of the grieving Mary holding the limp, lifeless body of Jesus. Gentle sorrow reflected in her face and her posture reveals her resignation as she gestures the return of her son to God. Jesus' body lay in Mary's lap appearing as a sleeping child. In fact, it is no mistake that Michelangelo made the scale of Jesus' body smaller than His mother's to emphasize that He was the son of God and child of mankind.

David, in the Bible story, is a small boy who downs the giant with a single stone. Michelangelo decidedly captures the upper story of David as one with the strength and determination of God, becoming a figural giant in his mission.

Michelangelo is still considered the master of marble sculptors in that he knew precisely how to tap the marble crystals so not to disturb their fragility, to maintain the lustrous natural surface and still produce profoundly realistic expressive super-forms.

While he did not consider himself a painter Michelangelo's Sistine Chapel ceiling and Last Supper are two of the world's most beloved paintings from the Late Renaissance and Mannerist periods of art. In his later years, he was commissioned by the pope to complete the then half finished St. Peter's church, but he did not live to see this occur. Only after his death were his plans for the 138 foot diameter dome employed. The dome which design-wise was deemed risky at the time still stands today, even though more iron rings were later added to the original three rings that reinforce the inside of the dome form. A lesser known fact is that the capitol dome in Harrisburg PA is a near half-scale replica of Michelangelo's dome.

Sculptor, painter, architect... Michelangelo not only aimed high he established himself a superior in all of Western art.
