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The ARTicle

Who is Banksy? He's the British 40-something artist whose art we have all likely seen, if not in real life, in the news or in The Smithsonian Magazine!?! He's worth approximately \$20million...There are no known photos of him, his real name unknown, he's an in-your-face artist, he's the godfather of the street art form called Stencil Art and known by the art world at large as the artist who-doesn't-want-his-art-to-be-worth-anything(1)...His art is political, satirical, social, original, and unique, he especially disdains government, celebrities and advertisers...His art is found on building walls,

subways, vehicles, construction equipment, sidewalks, and on just about any non-traditional ground...His art has a certain poignant irreverence and is likely done on illegal surfaces!

Can you relate to the artist, always in disguise, who continually creates art more prolifically than perhaps any artist in history, and then ironically, after he quickly and cheaply

creates his mostly illegal large stencil art, people come out of the woodwork to capitalize on it? For example, there was the abandoned municipal water storage tank that Banksy said reminded him of an elephant so that's exactly what he stenciled onto the tank. The tank was privately purchased and scheduled for destruction until the owners realized the value of his art on it. When Banksy found out that a homeless man, who had apparently lived in the tank for years, was to be displaced by its demolition or sale, in protest He refused to validate the tank art. The owners subsequently lost out on making BIG bucks on the resale of the tank as an object of art. BTW: Banksy set the homeless man up in an apartment and paid his rent for a year. Also, as a rule he does not validate much of his art due to the possible legal entanglements.

Banksy's stencil art calls attention to the multitude of "sins" he feels the "establishment" puts upon the common man. Through the sale of his legitimate works, some fellow street artists feel he has "soldout", but "Banksy is not represented by an art gallery, is not on Facebook and has never used Twitter." (2) In

at: faq@banksy.co.uk.....No Kidding!

Banksy sums up his art philosophy this way: "Art should comfort the disturbed and disturb the comfortable."(3) This writer doesn't take to Banksy's daily antagonism, especially the illegal angle, yet she finds his his quick wit and images refreshing in the otherwise usual sea of sinking contemporary art. How about you?
