Mark Rothko

Born: September 25, 1903 Died: 1970

Artist's Quote:

It is a widely accepted notion among painters that it does not matter what one paints as long as it is well painted. This is the essence of academicism. There is no such thing as good painting about nothing.

Mark Rothko was born Marcus Rothkowitz in Dvinsk, Russia (today Daugavpils, Latvia), 4th child, immigrated to USA in 1913 to settle in Portland Oregon. With highly ambitious intellect, Rothko aimed to become an engineer or attorney with an academic scholarship to Yale University. He dropped out after his third year to pursue his art studies with Max Weber at the renown Art Student's League in New York City. He also had an interest in acting, though he tried, nothing except perhaps his lifelong interest in murals due to the exposure to large stage sets. His art career embraced numerous painting mediums with oils dominating.

The 1930's found Rothko exhibited and making friends in the art community. For two years, during the Depression, he made easel paintings for the Works Progress Administration Federal Art Project.

Stemming from the Great Depression and WWII, the social stresses of the 1930's and 40's found Rothko moving away figurative art to symbolic expression. He quickly made connections in the art world particularly with Adolph Gottlieb, and they along with others formed the Ten, a group of artists dedicated to abstraction and expressionism in the 1940's.

Near the end of the 1940's, Rothko abandoned all figurative references in his art for complete nonobjectivity claiming that the elements and principles in relationship to the picture plane was pure and honest. He numbered his titles so as not to deliver a hint of what is expected when looking at his paintings, providing carte blanche to the viewer's imaginative interpretation.

The mature height of his art saw luminous color shapes seemingly floating above a radiant contrasting canvases. As with most art, and especially true of Rothko's, photographs of his paintings do no justice to what he achieved.

In spite of his physical decline due to heavy drinking, a heart condition and depression, Rothko continued to paint and exhibit to the end of his life with his works commissioned and shown by prestigious entities such as but not limited to the Guggenheim Museum in NYC, MOMA, Harvard University, the National Gallery of Art and the Four Seasons Restaurant in New York City.
